Rattle Noisemaker

Invite children to make these simple noisemakers for cheering on their favorite sports teams.



- 1. Place a handful of dried beans. rice, clean fish tank gravel, shiny pennies, or colorful beads inside a clean empty plastic bottle.
- 2. For safety, glue the lid onto the bottle so that it cannot be removed.
- 3. Decorate with stripes of colored tape or stickers.

Easy Animal Crackers Recipe

Ingredients

1 cup whole-wheat flour 1/2 tsp baking powder

2 tbls maple syrup 1/2 tsp vanilla 1/8 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup butter, softened

*Preheat the oven-375°F. Line two baking sheet with parchment paper.

Place all ingredients into a bowl and use your hand to mix together to form a dough. (If the dough is a little crumbly, add 1 tbls additional milk.) Flatten dough.

Roll the dough 1/4 inch thick between two pieces of lightly floured pieces of parchment paper. The flour will ensure that the cuts are easy to move. Cut out the dough with a cookie cutter and place on baking sheets. Bake 7-9 min., until lightly brown, Remove from the oven, let cool on the baking sheet for a minute, and transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Snowman in a Bottle

Materials Needed:

clear water bottle, cotton balls, googly eyes, orange construction paper, glue, sock, ribbon, black crayon or marker

Instructions:


Have your child fill the water bottle with cotton balls (great activity for fine motor development!)

- place eyes on front of the bottle
- cut a triangle from the orange construction paper and glue on front of the bottle for the snowman's nose (great opportunity to discuss colors/shapes!)
- draw on black dots using a black crayon or marker for the snowman's smile (great opportunity to discuss emotions, happy/sad)
- tie ribbon around the middle of the bottle as a scarf for the snowman
